Dear Campers One and All, Big and Small:

Very recently it was necessary for Carl and I to make a trip to camp to finish up some work there. We remarked about how very cold and uninviting it seemed where only a few weeks before it had been most inviting because of warmth of the laughter of children, the good times and the spiritual uplift which comes from wholesome recreation, a searching after truth and Christian fellowship. Every stone, every nook and corner from the kitchen and dining-hall to the auditorium were alive with precious memories of campers and helpers during the past summer. Yes, some of the memories reached back over the past twenty years.

At this Christmas Season, we think of the 3,200 campers of 1945 who are scattered to the four corners of the U. S. and some are now in foreign countries. How I wish for a Wawbee Waves big enough to carry a personal message from each one of you. But wherever you are, may you show forth from day to day that beautiful spirit of sacrificial giving and Christian fellowship so characteristic of all the camps last summer. Camp Mack's value is measured only as the Abundant Life is taught and lived by her campers and leaders.

Many of you know that Mr. Shultz is in Poland. He and Clarence Sink are in company with 16 other men taking 375 heifers to Danzig. Poland, 150 of which were donated by the Church of the Brethren. In a letter, mailed from England, he said that eight baby calves had been born since they had left the United States, two were dead at birth but the others were frisky little fellows. Wouldn't it be great fun to take a peak at the cattle being cared for on board the ship?

This will be the first Christmas in thirty years that Mr. Shultz and I have not spent Christmas together and the children have never known a Christmas without Daddy. Needless to say how much we will miss him, yet we are happy that he can have a small part in bringing relief to so many suffering people. He plans to return to the U. S. A. in January.

His last words, written as he sailed down the Chesapeake Bay toward the Atlantic ocean, were, "Tell the people to give and give, for it is only thru our gifts of money, food and clothing, prompted by a heart of love, can the relief program be carried on."

May God help us as campers, leaders and as Christians everywhere not only to give of our abundance but to share by buying less for ourselves that we may give still more to the starving children, fathers and mothers who are our neighbors across the sea. "Nothing endures save what we give; nothing dies save what we hold fast to."

At this Christmas season and thru the New Year, may peace abide in our hearts ONLY as we show forth His love from day to day in our words and deeds of kindness.

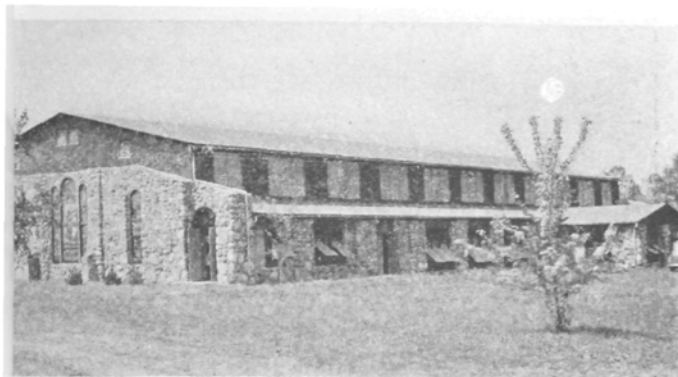

WHERE

Camp Mack is located two miles southeast of Milford, Indiana, just east of state road 15 and south of U. S. road 6 three miles. Come to Milford and if on bus or train you can phone for conveyance. You may arrange to come to Syracuse on the Baltimore and Ohio or to Warsaw on the Pennsylvania. Milford is on the Big Four and the Indiana Bus Line from Goshen to Indianapolis.

WHEN

Our Brethren camps open usually on a Sunday afternoon with enrollment beginning about two o'clock. Camp closes after the noon meal the following Sunday. The Training School and Young Adults begin on other days as indicated by literature.

HOW MUCH

Costs are moderate, \$9.60. For the entire fee—\$10.60—board and room, and use of equipment the costs are: Juniors \$8.60, Intermediate \$9, and Young People \$10. Training School \$8.10. Young Adults \$2.50. Some additional money will be needed for supplies, hobbies and incidental expenses. No six for five arrangement this year. The 60c additional is for insurance.

MAIL

Advance registration to Camp Mack, Milford. Ask for information from Camp Mack, Milford, Indiana. Have your mail sent care of Camp Mack, Milford, Indiana.

WHO

Our campers run in age from nine to ninety. Ages of Juniors and Intermediates this year must be limited to the ages (9-11) and (12-15) respectively. This must be done for the sake of the camp's ability to care for the numbers that come. Those under nine and over eleven can not be cared for well in the Junior group.

WHAT TO BRING

Plenty of bedding, a pillow, suitable clothes for camping, towel and soap, bathing suit, robe to wear to and from the beach, a Bible, pencil or pen, notebook, tennis racket, camera, musical instrument, and an open mind with a desire to be friendly. Be sure to consult your doctor so that the camp may know of any necessary safeguards to help you and the other campers.

The fees have been increased this year (with the exception of the young adults) to care for insurance (health, accident, and accidental death benefit.) Otherwise the fees are the same as last year. Local churches would do well to arrange for their delegation to be paid for by one check.

DISTRICT BOARDS AND OFFICERS — Each church in this region should be represented in the Training School sponsored by the region. Paul Kinsel of Ohio is again arranging an excellent program for the School. The various Boards of Christian Education of the Districts are back of this school and they should give the school their best support. Some districts have scholarships that make it possible for each school to have representation at low expense. Will we support it in 1946?

LOCAL CHURCH PASTORS AND SUPERINTENDENTS. Please see that proper publicity is done through some person appointed for the work. Have posters and other literature displayed and see that the camp for your district or region has a good delegation arranged for. This should be done as early as you can so that arrangements can be effected before the camp time arrives. Local churches often arrange scholarships for those who represent them.
