Project Real Job—Summer Camp Jobs Exposed!

Caution, this first paragraph may cause a bit of an eye roll for anyone who has ever worked in the camping industry. Imagine this, an Executive Director of a camp walks into an event, and a person making introductions introduces them to another person saying something like this. "Nice to meet you, this is (insert name) and they are a camp counselor at (Insert camp name)" I'm not making this up. I have seen and experienced this with everyone from an camp counselor, to a program director, to an executive director at a camp. If you have worked in the camping world for any period of time, you have most likely been introduced as a camp counselor at some point in your career. Don't get me wrong, camp counselors are awesome and are the backbone of the program. Counselors are the ball of energy that lead Bible studies one moment, recreation next, and then take the time to comfort a homesick camper. Counselors, summer staff, persons in the camping industry as a carreer, your experience matters! Which brings me to Project Real Job.

Project Real Job is a new volunteer initiative through the American Camp Association that is working to expose summer camp jobs for what they really are, a real job! I am excited because they have released 3 posters that guide summer staff as they fill out resumes, apply for jobs, and interview post summer camp. PRJ is all about translating the camp employment experience to future employers. These posters help staff focus on active language for resumes, 21st century skills that are developed and practiced at camp, and how to demonstrate the critical thinking and problem solving skills used at camp.

As we look forward to summer, we are currently accepting applications and interviewing for our summer positions at Camp Mack. We are looking for 10 Summer Staff, a Challenge Course Manager, Waterfront Supervisor, Program Assistant, and Summer Photographer. After a summer on staff, skills a summer staffer may leave with may include: 5 ways to plunge a toilet, how to expertly line up plates in a dish rack, belay skills, how to give a swim test at the waterfront, how to start a campfire in the rain, a dozen new campfire songs, how to live with roommates, and so much more. But, what a summer staffer is really walking away with after a summer at camp are skills like critical thinking, problem solving, communication, creativity, contribution, leadership, and the list goes on. They are also walking away with new certifications in areas such as lifeguarding that may lead to a supervisor position at a pool or other waterfront.

CAMP ALEXANDER MACK STRATEGIC PLAN SUMMARY

Goal Area 1: Maintaining our historic tie to the Church of the Brethren we seek to re-envision a future of Camp Mack in order to expand its ministry.

Strategy one: Review and articulate the core elements of Camp Mack's ministry to encourage faith development and stewardship of creation within the context of Christian values. **Strategy two**: Develop a governing philosophy and framework that maintains our historic ties to the COB while engaging the broader community in the transformative power of Camp's mission.

Goal Area 2 – Ensure the financial health of Camp Mack to propel its ministry into the future. Strategy 3: Ensure that the facilities meet the future needs of campers and guests for retreats, conferences, and year-round programming. **Strategy 4**: Ensure that the green spaces and natural environment meets the current and

future needs of Camp Mack.

Goal Area 4: Strengthen the transformational impact of Camp Mack through maximizing current programming, introducing innovative programming, and providing holy hospitality. **Definition of terms:**

Program: An event or series of events to which campers and guests are invited and Camp Mack provides all or most of the programming. **Programming**: Specific activities provided as part of a Camp Mack program or contracted by a

guest program. Strategy 1: Meet the needs of existing and new audiences through creating new and diverse

activities

Strategy 2: Strengthen and expand year-round programming to deepen our relationship with current audiences and meet the needs of new audiences. Strategy 3: Ensure each group and program receives a unique experience that meets their needs, guided by the mission, vision, and values of Camp Mack. Strategy 4: Identify new target audiences to expand the reach of Camp Mack's mission and

programs.


Goal Area 5: Promote the mission of Camp Mack by strengthening donor and community relationships.
