Group Hugs



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The "Eagles" have arrived!

This winter, Camp was approached by three Boy Scouts that wanted to work at becoming Eagle Scouts. Part of that process is doing a service project for their community. All three boys chose Camp as the place they wanted to do their projects.

The first project was led by Riley Frey. Riley is a freshman at Goshen High School and has been a scout for five years. His leader is Mike Clemons, whose son Preston has come to camp for several years. Riley's project was adding three sections to our nature boardwalk in the south wetlands. I suspect it has been ten years or so since we built the nature walk. Jess takes our summer camp kids out on it and they lie down and discover the little ecosystems at work out there. It's a great place to see God's handiwork in our corner of his universe.

Riley organized, funded, and led this project with a little coaching from me. He solicited individuals and business for support and was successful in raising the funds. We then met on a rain threating Saturday morning and started the project. He had eight to ten



other scouts and leaders to help him. He organized his help into two groups. One group stayed on dry ground and brought components to the second group that was in the wetlands. At this time of the year the wetlands have six to eight inches of water flowing through them and the vegetation is six to eight feet high. This group in the water needed to wear waders to keep warm and dry. The process included putting down some stone to form a base and then putting some solid cement blocks with an 8" x 8" x 4' piece of cement for a header for the deck frame to sit on.

We had a fine day, and by five o'clock we were done. Under Riley's excellent leadership we now have a longer wilderness boardwalk that will serve us for years to come. It was a pleasure to work with this young man and we look forward to working with the other scouts in the near future.

Never Stop Learning

Learning is a lifelong process. This week, I have been co-teaching a Waterfront Lifeguard class for Camp Mack and Quaker Haven Camp at the Wawasee Pool and in the lake here at Camp Mack. Lifeguard training is only the beginning. Lifeguards will have a card that documents when they took the class, but now is when the learning really begins. There are many details that go into waterfront lifeguarding here that include Rescue Boat training, Small Craft Training, instruction on how to teach small craft and snorkeling classes, camp specific rules, and weekly emergency action plan drills.

Teaching CPR classes and Lifeguard training is a great reminder for me that we are always learning and many times the training we take is just the beginning to something bigger. This year it was a joy to watch a lifeguard I trained last year take a job at a pool this last fall and winter and then come back to Camp Mack this year as our Waterfront Director.

If you see something that peaks your interest, take a class, learn something new, and step outside of your comfort zone. You never know where it will take you. Never stop learning.

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Spread the Love

My assistant Anna found this new recipe on Pinterest a few months ago, and it is becoming a new staff favorite. I often eat much more of it than I should, and the rest of the camp staff feel the same way. You just can't help but eat another bite or two or three. I love how warm and sweet and gooey it is fresh out of the oven. Take it to a carry-in for dessert, or fix it for breakfast and enjoy it with a warm cup of coffee, but this is definitely a breakfast dessert to share.

Cinnamon Roll Coffee Cake

Ingredients Cake:

½ cup butter, melted

2 eggs

1 cup sugar

3 cups flour

2 tsp vanilla

4 tsp baking powder

1/4 tsp salt

1½ cups milk

Topping:

1 cup butter, melted

1 cup brown sugar

2 Tbsp flour

1 Tbsp cinnamon

Glaze:

2 cups powdered sugar, sifted

5 Tbsp milk

1tsp vanilla

Instructions

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F.

In a large bowl, mix all the cake ingredients together until well combined.

Pour into a greased 9x13 pan.

For the topping, mix all the ingredients together in a small bowl until well combined.

Spread evenly on the batter and swirl with a knife. Bake at 350 for 30-35 minutes.

For the glaze, mix all the ingredients together in a small bowl until it is a consistency like pancake syrup.

While warm, drizzle the glaze over the cake and it will set into a harder glaze.

Serve warm or at room temperature.
