Impact

It's too early to talk about Christmas; Thanksgiving is yet to come. However, one of my favorite movies – the only one I have to watch every year – crossed my mind the other day. *It's a Wonderful Life* is not the best written movie, nor does it have the best production value, but it never fails to make me cry. It's all about making a difference in people's lives by being faithful in relationships and ideals.

As I was working on stories we plan to tell over the next few months, I thought, "What would the world be like if Camp Mack never existed?" It was actually a difficult question, because, just as George Bailey couldn't grasp that he no longer existed, I don't remember a time when Camp Mack wasn't central to my life in Indiana. What difference has Camp Mack made here?

The easy answer is tens of thousands of children and youth have had their lives changed over the 93 years of service. They experienced committed faithful adults who created welcoming Christian communities showing love, peace, joy, and lives dedicated to serving one another. They learned about the natural world – God's Creation – and the ways we and the environment around us impact each other. They developed life-long relationships and created new interests through the daily activities. Some met God for the very first time. Some committed their lives to faithfully following Jesus.

We don't often think about the thousands of volunteers who have experienced grace, learned about service, and reveled in the joy of sharing God's love with others. Over the years, I have volunteered in over 40 different camps, and I know that my faith has been strengthened beyond imagination by the experience.

Congregations meet and work at camp. Retreats, programs, work sessions, and worship are opportunities to build the community and to connect with God's blessing. Other groups find the holy hospitality of Camp Mack brings them life and connection they may not yet be able to describe.

I don't have the opportunity to see what life would be like if Camp Mack had never existed, but I do know that experiences here sometimes push and other times nudge people in new directions. Like Robert Frost says in his poem, **The Road Not Taken**: *Two roads diverged in a wood, and* I - I *took the one less traveled by, and that has made all the difference.* Thank you for supporting Camp Mack as we make a difference for the people who find sanctuary here.


Who has the green grass?

Progress!

We are making progress on some of our deferred maintenance issues we have here at Camp. We just completed the siding/window project at Ulrich and we are well on our way to completion on Shultz Chapel. More on those projects later.

We had some leak issues with the lower roof on Sarah Major this spring. The DeKalb soccer boys helped us tear that off and to start putting the new roof on. We just have a little bit on the south slope and the ridge to finish.

Last summer we had the stonework done on the well part of Jacob's well with Lynn Kreider and his volunteer crew building a new roof for that. We finished with putting on a metal roof this spring and it really looks nice. This summer we moved over to the pavilion part of Jacob's well and with the help of Family Camp we took the shingles off the west side, replaced some decking, and covered it with felt. We hope to be able to take the east side off yet this fall and cover it with felt and then we would be ready to put some metal roofing on it next summer.

We have a couple Eagle Scout projects in progress. One is in the archery area. They resided and reroofed the storage building and are in the process of building a shade for kids to stand under while waiting their turn at the archery course. The other project is a new compost bin area just outside the east end of the John Kline Center. This will be a working compost pile but we will use it to educate our guests as well. This project is in the planning stage but we hope to complete it before winter.

These projects represent a lot of work but we have had lot of volunteer help to do them. Without that help we could not have done them. These projects also represent being good stewards of the buildings we have so that we can continue to provide "...a sanctuary where people connect with God."

Another Way of Giving



Building the Memories

Few places carry quite the memories as Shultz Chapel. With the opening towards the lake, it connects us to both God and nature. It was built in 1948, making it one of the newer buildings at Camp Mack. L.W. Shultz served as the first director of Camp Mack in 1925 until his retirement in 1956. At his side was Cora, his wife, who was also highly involved with the early years of Camp Mack. Now, it is a popular wedding destination, or place to escape the craziness of our world.

In the 70 years since, things have not always been as pristine as they were in 1948. The stonework was falling apart and the roof sometimes leaked. Our sacred space was falling apart. Earlier this year, we asked you to contribute to restore

this building, to make sure it was standing for another 70 years.

You responded with a resounding, "Yes!" We raised \$13,375 to fund these renovations. The gifts ranged in size from \$25 to \$5,000 with all sizes in between. The stonework has been ongoing with many rocks being mortared into place. That work is almost complete with the new roof coming soon.

Construction is exciting, but even more so is when it is finished. Part of our goal at Camp is to be transparent and open to what is going on. You deserve to know the progress we have made in every way, shape, and form. Thank you for supporting this important project not just for Camp Mack's history, but for our future.

Chocolate Chip Cookie Cheesecake Bars

This recipe is quickly becoming a new camp favorite! We hope you enjoy it as much as we do.

Ingredients

- 1 18 oz roll refrigerated chocolate chip cookie dough
- 8 oz cream cheese softened
- 1/2 cup granulated sugar
- 1 egg room temperature
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 F.
- 2. Line a 9-inch square baking dish with parchment paper or non-stick foil. Set aside.
- 3. Spread a little more than half of the cookie dough onto the bottom of the baking dish and press down firmly creating an even layer.
- 4. Using a stand mixer or hand held mixer, beat the cream cheese until light and fluffy.
- 5. Add in the sugar and beat until combined.
- 6. Beat in the egg and vanilla extract until smooth.
- 7. Pour the cheesecake filling over the top of the cookie dough base.
- 8. Crumble the remaining cookie dough over the top.
- 9. Bake for 30 to 35 minutes.
- 10. Let cool completely before cutting into bars.
- 11. Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator.

- *The family of God is incredible!


We raised over \$17,000 at this year's festival making it one of our most successful ever. Thank you for tuning in, and I hope you had fun!

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A Lasting Legacy



Sel and Frankie Copeland were great friends of Camp Mack. These two teachers from Nappanee, Indiana came to camp as campers, sent their children to camp as parents, and volunteered their time as faithful members of the Church of the Brethren. Though they have passed away, their participation at Camp Mack continues.

Frankie loved working with youth, and her passion caused her to create and lead an all-state travel camp that served high school youth over several years. Many remember her dedication and love in those special days.

Sel volunteered in facility and truly enjoyed building and repairing facilities over the summers. He was proud of pointing at his work and enjoyed knowing that he had made a difference.

After the estate for Sel and Frankie was settled, their children wanted to make certain their passions were continued, and they made a large contribution from the estate to keep their legacy alive. Part of the money was used to replace windows and reside Ulrich House. This building was built as a staff house, but over the years, it combined for staff in the summer and retreats during the rest of the year. The windows were in disrepair and drafty. The shingle siding was falling off. Now, because of the memory of the Copelands, Ulrich House has beautiful working windows, high insulation, and low maintenance siding that will last for years to come making our guests feel welcome and comfortable.

The rest of the bequest was designated for camper scholarships. This money was put into an endowment with the Community Foundation of Elkhart County. The foundation matched 25% of the donation making the full endowment \$100,000! This is a permanent fund that will grow and send children to camp every year.
