Building Lives at Camp

"These words I speak to you are not incidental additions to your life, homeowner improvements to your standard of living. They are foundational words, words to build a life on. If you work these words into your life, you are like a smart carpenter who built his house on solid rock. Rain poured down, the river flooded, a tornado hit—but nothing moved that house. It was fixed to the rock. But if you just use my words in Bible studies and don't work them into your life, you are like a stupid carpenter who built his house on the sandy beach. When a storm rolled in and the waves came up, it collapsed like a house of cards." Matthew 7:24-27 (The Message)

There are two kinds of people we serve here at Camp Mack: children and adults. If you fit one of those categories, we are the perfect place for you this summer.

March Volunteer Work Days

The second week of March we had a work camp and tackled several projects. I thought I would share what we did and who did it.

In room #3 of Sarah Major Lodge, the old exhaust pipe from the water heater came up through the floor and went into the chimney. The pipe had been covered up with a hand wash sink vanity. With the installation of the new boiler and hot water heater we no longer had a need for the exhaust pipe, so therefore we could move and replace the vanity. We also needed to replace the wall insulation and cover up the chimney in that room. Merl Montel and Norm Waggy spent Monday tearing out the old car siding and loose insulation and beginning to install new insulation, visqueen, drywall, and car siding.

Mike Kauffman came on Tuesday and Wednesday and finished the wall and added some electrical switches and receptacles for the new vanity. That whole southeast wall in that room has now been finished and looks very good. There had been a pretty good draft when we had south winds around the chimney, and now that is all insulated and covered.


In the main room of Sarah Major we try to polyurethane the walls every five years or so. We were past time to get this done, so Carol Waggy and Bev Weaver did a couple of the walls for us on Monday. That really puts a sparkle in the room!

Nate Crain came for all three days and worked on the northwest restroom (one the W Cabin circle). On the women's side we are trying to create some changing areas connected to each shower. This means we will go from six showers to four showers, but each shower will have a private changing area. Nate took his trusty sledgehammer in hand and knocked out some block walls and cleaned up his mess. We are now ready to build some panels to create the changing areas.

Andrew Kauffman also came all three days, and I kept him busy with a variety of projects. One of those projects was to run a small water line to the coffee maker in Sarah Major. That turned out to be challenging because you just never know what you may find inside the walls in an old building!

I want to thank each one of these folks for giving of their time and energy to this place. This gives a lift to the facility crew and really improves the way we "provide a Sanctuary where people connect with God."

My Camp Staff Journey

I was the youngest grandchild on both sides of the family when I first got to attend Grand Camp. Everyone else had already experienced Camp Mack before me, so I got to hear all about it from my older sister and cousins. Once I started coming to camp I never stopped! Every summer it was the highlight of my vacation. Like anything else, I have both great, fond memories and not-so-great miserable ones. I hated how wet my shoes and socks got every morning on the walk to and from breakfast but loved going to morning dip every morning. I remember one time having a terrible stomach ache and staying in my cabin all afternoon while everyone else got to have fun. But, my cousin who was in another camp that same week got to come sit with me for a little while. We had some great chats that afternoon.

When my sister decided to work at camp the summer after she graduated high school, I remember feeling such awe. I had no idea that you could get paid to spend the summer at camp. It sounded like the best job in the world! After hearing about all her amazing adventures, I knew I wanted to do that, too. So, the spring of my senior year of high school I filled out my first ever job application, and when my sister drove up to camp for her returning staff interview, I went with her and had my first job interview. I sat down with two management team members, and they asked me about my camp experience and why I wanted to work at camp. I talked to them about my love for this place and how I didn't want my last year in Youth Camp to be my last year at camp. We talked a lot about the differences between participating in the camp experience and providing the experience for others. My sister and my cousin had both worked on staff before, so I KNEW there was a large difference and that it was going to be a lot of hard work. But I also felt, even at the young age of 18, that I was supposed to be doing the work for camp.



It was definitely harder than I thought it would be—not as much physically (although there were many very long days with lots of sore muscles), but mentally. I did a lot of growing and maturing during the years I was on summer staff. I learned a lot of life lessons. And, I found so much joy in the work I was doing. Lifeguarding on the waterfront was a blast. I loved belaying at the climbing tower and climbing whenever time permitted. After the summer I came back every weekend I could. There were always retreats and banquets that the kitchen needed help with. I made some amazing friendships and learned from some great managers. I just happened to meet my husband in the mix, as well. He was a Brethren Volunteer Service volunteer from Pennsylvania who spent two years working at camp. We got engaged at camp, moved out East, then got married at camp a few years later.

I thought that after our wedding our camp story was ending — that maybe we would send our future children to Camp Mack, but our lives were going to be spent out East. We would joke about what it would take to get us back to camp again. It was the dream that you talk about but never expect to happen, like winning the lottery. But God had other plans.

We decided to visit again for the 95th "Back to Mack' celebration. It had been a really hard year and spending a weekend at camp with our friends and family was a breath of fresh air. I helped volunteer in the kitchen, and Tony Keck gave me a big hug and told me there would always be a place for me

in the kitchen if I wanted it. His words really stuck with me, but I had a job, a home, and family back in PA that I did not want to leave. Fast forward almost a year later. Our son Oliver had just been born, and I could not stop thinking about Tony's offer to come back and work in the kitchen. I sent him an email asking if he had been serious about his offer and if there would be any available positions in the near future. He responded back enthusiastically. Yes, there was a kitchen supervisor position open and how soon could I be back?! After a lot of praying, a lot of late night conversations, and some doors opening at just the right time, we realized that God was leading our little family back to Milford, IN. I accepted the position, and we were quickly packing our home and preparing to move back to camp. A message from camp a few weeks before we were leaving informed me of the changes to the food service director position. I knew God was calling me to camp, so I pushed aside any fear I had of working under a different manager than my good cousin Tony and we continued with our packing.

Working under our interim director, Wanda, was easier than I had imagined. We made a good team and she really showed me the ropes. When camp started the process of filling the permanent director position, she was the one encouraging me to apply. I had no intention of becoming the food service director, but she showed me that I was the perfect person for the job. I know that God put her in my life to show me what I was capable of.

When I started my first summer on summer staff, I never thought I would be where I am today. Throughout this journey I have met so many amazing people, and it's been a privilege to grow with our summer staff members over the years. I can't wait to see where this year's summer staff will be in 16 years.

Wilderness Survival Day a Hit!



Last month we had our fourth home school outdoor education day of the school year and this time the theme was wilderness survival. We had a magical day of sunny weather following a VERY cold weekend and it was a perfect day to spend in the wilderness area! Before we left the safety of main camp, we made mini survival kits, learned how to use a compass, and discussed some additional ways to tell which direction is north if you didn't have a compass with you (like moss on trees, branches on trees, the direction clouds are moving, etc.)

When we arrived in the woods, we talked about the rule of 3s: a person can survive for 3 minutes without air, 3 hours without shelter, 3 days without water, and 3 weeks without food. Then we took care of each of those needs in order of importance, which means we started with building shelters (thankfully, the trees in the woods provided us with plenty of air). The kids built some very large shelters that were truly impressive. Several of the shelters fit their whole group inside of them and were even waterproof!

After that, we hiked further back into the woods and learned how to build fires and filter water. Many kids had never struck a match before! We got some fires going, cooked a bit of lunch (pizza wraps: my favorite campfire food!), and boiled some pond water we collected into a tin mug. I was impressed with how many kids were willing to drink the water we boiled and filtered, despite its greenish yellow color!



We talked a little bit about survival foods and the kids tried some emergency rations, surprised at how good some of them can be (and not surprised at how awful some can be too). We also learned about edibility tests that are used to tell if things like berries are safe to eat.

We had a fun time exploring the woods and playing some games too, but eventually all good things come to an end. Once we had hiked back, we finished our day making paracord bracelets and restocking our mini survival kits. Overall, it was super fun and everyone survived! I love that we have such an amazing property here at camp to be able to disappear into the woods all day and learn new things. If you haven't been out to camp recently to hike in the woods, come and visit us! Stop by the office and let us know you're here – we'd love to say hello!

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
How can we support Camp Mack?

Community Campers

The Community Camper program is one that began in 2017. Since its beginning, many children, who otherwise would not have had the opportunity, experienced the Christian community and life-changing impact of Camp Mack.

As we enter the summer of 2022, more and more churches are accepting the challenge of sending a child from their community to camp. This is truly a win-win-win for everyone. The child wins with the experience; the camp wins by having another camper; the church wins by making new connections in the community.

Here is how it works:

- 1. Create a small fundraiser like a bake sale or community meal. (You can also take up a special offering or include in the budget, but it's not as much fun, and it doesn't open your doors to the community.)
- 2. Use the money raised to send one or more campers from your community to camp.
- 3. Find a child or children to send to camp. Many churches contact school counselors, township trustees, or community-based service groups to find children who would not otherwise be able to come to camp.
- 4. Connect with families to offer the opportunity and get campers registered.
- 5. Let Camp Mack know who your community campers are, so we can share some of their experiences with you when they return home.
- 6. Celebrate your campers before they go and after they return. If you have a potluck as part of the celebration, you'll have an opportunity to share with the whole family!

The benefits to the campers and to Camp Mack are obvious. The benefits to your congregation may not be so clear, but they are there:

- Church fellowship in organizing and completing a fundraiser.
- Opportunities to meet the community at your fundraiser.
- Connections made with people in your community who are helping those in need.
- Connection with one or more families of the campers you send.
- Knowledge that you are supporting the Great Commission of Matthew 28:29-30.
