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News from the Director

Preparing for Summer 2021

In April, we made the difficult decision to cancel our in-person summer camp for 2020. There were a lot of reasons for the decision, but three of them really stood out. First, we were receiving a lot of confusing and changing information about what would be a safe way to hold camp. Secondly, we could not offer a camp experience that would give campers the kind of fun and community we believe is vitally important. Finally, we knew there was not enough time to plan for all the changes we would need to make.

When we made the decision, there was hope that COVID-19 would be resolved before the end of the year, and now we know that won't be the case. In fact, it is likely that all of us will continue to make some sacrifices and accommodations through 2021 and into 2022; although, we are optimistic things will have improved a great deal.

With all that said, it is crucial to our mission that we have summer camp in 2021. Our mission is to spread the good news of God's love to all. So many of our campers depend on the activity and community of camp. We cannot lose another year.

We now have a much better understanding of how the virus spreads, and we know how to take precautions to keep people as safe as possible. Since March, when we faced a lockdown in our state, our entire staff has continued to be COVID-free. We have developed protocols to keep our staff and our guests safe, and they have worked well. There have been no suspected cases of exposure through Camp Mack. Additionally, we are continuing to learn from camps who did hold sessions last summer, and area schools are showing us effective ways to provide safe environments and interaction.

Our mission is to provide sanctuary, connection with God, experiences in creation, and Christian community. Throughout these several months, our staff has been focused on how we can make these things happen even when safety requires some physical distancing or other restrictions. We have some great ideas.

We also have time to plan. In fact, the process we are using is already happening. A committee is meeting monthly to talk about all aspects of camp and to provide feedback to operations



committees and staff. The operations committees are working on program, food service, safe facilities, rental camps, and registration. All of this is to ensure we can offer the best and safest experience possible next summer.

It also needs to be said that CAMP 2021 will not be entirely like the camps of the last few years. There will be changes, and these changes will be in place as long as COVID-19 poses a threat to our campers and families. Our goal, however, is to provide the core mission. Our campers need to feel safe; they need to be in the presence of God; they need to have incredible outdoor experiences; they need to have the powerful Christian community that is Camp Mack.

Please watch this monthly newsletter to see our plans as they develop. Our goal is to give you assurance that we are working hard to provide the program you expect from Camp Mack in as safe an environment as possible. One final thing. Nature Nut News

Riddle Me This



Feathers without wings Knees but cannot run A heart eternal that does not beat Home in water and on land What am I?

Did you get it? The clues all lead to the baldcypress tree. Although not native to Indiana, the beautiful tree with rusty orange needles in the autumn is one that can work well into our ecosystem here at camp. The baldcypress is native to the Southeastern US, but is very adaptable, living in swamps, flooded areas, and in drier areas.

Feathers without wings. Taking a look at the needles on twigs, they are flat, soft, and the branchlets have a feather-like appearance. The baldcypress is considered a deciduous conifer, as it has cones but loses its needle-like leaves in the autumn. The needles make for easy cleanup in the autumn. Another deciduous conifer is the Tamarack tree. Camp Mack is at the southern end of their native range and we are blessed to have a few on property.

Knees but cannot run. If you have been around a baldcypress swamp, you see the projections sticking up all around them. Woodcarvers love making these projections look like people. The pieces sticking up are called knees. Here at camp you may trip over them in the grasses near the trees.

A heart eternal that does not beat. If you look at a cross section of cypress wood, the sapwood is a creamy wood, and the heartwood center can take on a yellow to red appearance. The heartwood has been called wood eternal for being rot resistant. I would use the word eternal also as trees commonly live to over 600 years old, and some in the south have been living for over a 1000.

Home in water and on land. As mentioned before, baldcypress is highly adaptable to different environments. Many animals use the cypress as their homes, especially amphibians in an aquatic environment. So, as you've learned something new, come and get to know the cypress of camp along the shore of Lake Waubee.

We had volunteer work days and had five volunteers throughout the span of those three days. Marvene Pippenger and Kay Method did some painting in the north residence. At the Peace Garden, Judy DePue and Wayne Engdahl worked on the path at the entrance. It has edgers along the side and crushed limestone for the path. We also set the peace pole, and Judy is going to work on the lettering. At the bottom or lake end of the garden will be some swings. Camp's facility crew, Jim Bates, and Beth Sholly helped dig the holes (with a tractor-mounted post hole digger) and bring the base to grade. We then mixed concrete with a tractor-mounted cement mixer and poured the piers that the swings sit on. We now have ten pretty piers sticking out of the ground about six inches! Lynn and his crew continue to work on the beams and upright panels for the swings. With a little luck and some hard work, we will have the swing frames in place in the next couple of weeks. This will probably end work on the Peace Garden until next spring.

Due to the blessing of some donations, there is a new standing seam steel roof on Jacobs Well. Mast Construction came in and finished taking off the old shingles. They then put on the new metal roof. Wow does that look different and very nice. We were also able to purchase the shingles for the lower auditorium roof. We just need the time and some help in getting them on. Most of our retreat buildings were roofed in the late 90s and all need new roofs pretty soon. Gene is working diligently on getting some donors for the Sarah Major roof. We want to put a metal roof on it also.

In the midst of the doom and gloom of COVID-19 and the problems it has caused, we still have reasons to celebrate and have hope for a bright future for this "sanctuary where people connect with God".

Be Our Guest



Want to feel like you are actually at Camp Mack? You can now view several iconic sites at camp from wherever you are. Todd and I have been adding 360 degree views of Camp Mack onto Google Street View so that anyone can virtually tour camp! He has done a great job of scoping out the sites and uploading the images. We have been working with the facility crew to prepare the spaces and shoot informative views of camp. Right now, there are images of Kate Warstler Dining Room (partially set with dining rooms A, B, and C all open, and then A separately and B and C together), Turkey Creek Meeting Room, John Kline Welcome Center back porch with Arky Parky, Wedding Hill, the Lakeside Venue below Shultz Chapel, and Vesper Hill. Other inside spaces will be added this month so that you can view inside lodges and other rentable spaces.

This is still a work in progress! We are working on ways to present the map more clearly (with likely a labeled image to navigate) and have it accessible through Camp's website at campmack.org.

How to view these spaces (directions from the Google Maps phone app below, but can be accessed on Google Maps on the device of your choice with a similar process):

- 1. Open up your Google Maps app (or, if you do not have the app on your phone, download it in your phone's app store first) and click on the round icon in the upper right corner that has layered squares on it. Choose the "Street View" option with the cartoon person in the map image.
- 2. Search for "Camp Alexander Mack" in Milford, IN and zoom in to see the various blue circles around camp. Click on each one to view a spherical image of the space.
- 3. Scroll left, right, up, and down to see the space from that viewpoint.

Kitchen News

Apple Caramel Cupcakes

For our Tuesday To-Go meals the other week, I decided to switch up the dessert a little bit and make a fall themed cupcake. I didn't have any pumpkin on hand, so I went searching for a spice cake recipe and came across this spiced apple cake. It sounded so good with a caramel frosting and homemade caramel drizzle. I decided against making caramel from scratch when I made these because there was an excess of caramel sauce already in our dry storage room. I'm sure the homemade would have made them even more delicious, but it was nice to use something I already had on hand. The kitchen smelled so good as these cupcakes were baking. The office staff commented about how the whole building was smelling like fall. After we served all the to-go meals, there were several leftovers and Program Director Jessie said they were one of the best cupcakes she had ever tasted. This recipe is definitely one that we will save and use again.

INGREDIENTS

Frosting:

- 1/2 c sugar
- 1/4 c water
- 1/2 c heavy whipping cream
- 2 tsp vanilla
- 12 Tbsp butter, room temperature
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 1 c powdered sugar

Cupcakes:

- 1 1/4 c flour
- 1 tsp baking powder
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/4 tsp ground ginger
- 1/2 c granulated sugar
- 1/2 c brown sugar
- 1/4 c butter, room temperature
- 1 egg
- 1/2 tsp vanilla
- 6 Tbsp buttermilk
- 1 1/2 c shredded apple, peeled (any kind, I used Gala)

INSTRUCTIONS

Frosting:

1. Stir sugar and water together in a small pot and bring to a boil over medium-high heat. DO NOT STIR. Let it boil for 5-6 minutes or until it starts to turn a light caramel brown color. Remove from heat and slowly stream in the cream while stirring. Stir in the vanilla. Let it cool to room temperature (about 30 minutes). Meanwhile, make the cupcakes.

2. In a standing mixer, use the paddle attachment to beat the butter and salt together for 3 minutes at medium speed until light and fluffy. Add the sugar and mix it in starting with a low speed. Add half of the caramel (reserve the rest for drizzling) and beat for 2 minutes on medium speed until light and fluffy (scrape the sides of the bowl as needed).

3. Place frosting in a piping bag fitted with a star tip and pipe onto cooled cupcakes. Drizzle with caramel and serve.

Cupcakes:

- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 degree F and line a muffin tin with 12 cupcake paper liners.
- 2. In a mixing bowl, combine flour, baking powder, cinnamon, salt, and ginger together. Set aside.

3. In the bowl of a standing mixer beat butter and sugars together until light and fluffy. Mix in the egg and vanilla. Mix in the flour mixture a little at a time until just combined and then add the buttermilk and mix until combined. Fold in the shredded apple.

4. Spoon batter into cupcake liners filling them 3/4 full. Bake for 22-25 minutes or until toothpick comes out clean.

5. Let cupcakes cool for a few minutes in the tin and then remove onto a rack to cool completely before frosting.

New to Camp: Geocaching!



Part of the grant that funded our new high ropes course also funded starting a geocaching class for our outdoor education program. It's been fun for the kids, but we'd also like to share this activity with all of you!

Geocaching is treasure hunting with a GPS, and it's a great family activity. We've hidden more than a dozen geocaches around camp and in the wilderness area. You use a camp-provided GPS to navigate to the waypoints, then find the cache filled with prizes! You can also sign the logbook to let us know you found it.

The process is simple if you want to try out Camp Mack geocaching: stop by the office during regular office hours to rent a GPS for the day for only \$10. Each GPS comes with an instructional page on how to use it. The coordinates for the geocaches at camp are only found loaded onto our GPS units and are not found on public geocaching sites at this time, so you'll have to rent a GPS from us if you want to find the caches at camp.

You can also geocache around your hometown and even in other parts of the world. There are more than 3 million geocaches hidden around the globe in 191 different countries (there are even caches hidden in Antarctica)! Go to geocaching.com or download the app onto your smart phone and see where there are hidden caches near you. Geocaching is a great way to get the family out of the house and get some exercise while also seeing places you may have never visited before.

Geocaching is also a great excuse to come and enjoy the last of the beautiful fall colors here and spend some time outdoors before it gets chilly. We hope to see you soon!

Diversity Report

Through the month of October, some staff have participated in the *30 Days of Anti-Racism* program prepared by the United Methodist Church. Activities are mostly reflective and personal. Some of these involve journaling, prayer, individual study, and engaging with videos, art, and music. Others encourage participation in the community at places where people of color are often served. Staff found that there were a few activities that were not possible at this time; however, there are promises to complete them at some point in the future.

The program was effective as a spiritual discipline. It created space for listening to other voices, interacting with people in new ways, examination of biases and attitudes, and opportunities for movement of God's Spirit in our souls.

During the month of November, we will examine our policies and procedures related to hiring. Our first look at these gives us the impression that we do not actively discriminate; however, there is a concern that we are not visible or accessible to people of color. It is important that we continue to seek the best and most qualified employees for positions, but we also have to make sure that search is an open one that provides equal opportunities for all.
