From the Executive Director

Dear Friends of Camp Mack,

One of our staff members has this scripture from Jeremiah posted over his desk. He refers to it often in his own devotional time and in times of spiritual sharing as a community. When we step out in faith, we trust in this promise.

The last several years have been challenging because the world is different than it was pre-COVID. The needs of our children have changed; patterns of attendance, support, and operational costs are no longer predictable; responding to new needs of the people we welcome is increasingly expensive.

As the country experienced rapid inflation in materials, services, utilities, and food, so did we. Fees published in November of 2021 were not adequate for the expenses of 2022.

Yet there is much to celebrate. Camp Mack served a much higher number of partners and increased its overall reach to more people. The capital campaign reached its goal, and the final touches are almost done in the Ulrich renovation. Almost all our buildings are now under steel roof. A master facility plan is in the works.

We believe that God has plans for Camp Mack, and these plans are full of hope and a future of continued ministry. Thank you for your prayers and the many contributions of time and money that empower our ministry of hospitality.

HOPE AND A FUTURE

From the beginning, almost 100 years ago, Camp Mack shared hospitality with a variety of groups across the country. This ministry, founded by the Church of the Brethren, continues to serve other denominations, groups, and communities using its values and mission as guiding principles.

In the early 1980's, Camp Mack changed the summer camp program from individual district camps to shared camps. At that time, nearly all campers were from the Church of the Brethren. Arden Ball reported a total of 869 campers in 1981. By the 2010's, that number had fallen to less than 500 each year. Since the pandemic, it has been a struggle to reach 300 campers. And since the mid-1990's, the percentage of campers who regularly attend the Church of the Brethren has been shrinking.

Normally, program camps are first or second in revenue, but in 2022, the summer camp program was in third place. This reflects lower registration and significant inflation. Other income streams had increases, but not enough to make up for lost summer camp revenue and unexpected maintenance.

In response to these challenges, the current strategic plan and a newly revised business plan call for more emphasis on expanding the summer camp program by bringing children from the communities surrounding our supporting congregations while maintaining the identity values of the Church of the Brethren. Additionally, through research and careful planning, Camp Mack will update and create programs, services, and facilities that bring in a greater diversity of guests, providing opportunities for hospitality and ministry.

Immediate goals include:

- Acquire more responsive registration and database software.
- Build strong community connections to increase awareness and adoption
 of Camp Mack
- Pursue a Master Facility Plan that addresses future growth needs.

Long term goals include:

- Increase attendance at summer camp to 600.
- Increase usage of building rental capacity.
- Develop a year-round robust outdoor education program.
- Address accessibility issues regarding guests with mental and physical disabilities.

While Camp Mack had a difficult year financially, there is much to celebrate and great hope as we look to a future of careful stewardship and God's great plan for this ministry.







CELEBRATIONS

With the help of our financial supporters and volunteers, 2022 was an exciting year full of accomplishments. We thank God for so many wonderful gifts, particularly the people who keep this ministry strong.

In 2022 we:

- Completed the *Planting the Future* Capital Campaign, raising over \$1.1 million dollars for programs and modernization
- Continued growth in personal, family, and group retreats
- Began a new three-year strategic plan
- Completed the final phase of the Peace Garden overlooking Lake Waubee
- Made improvements to many buildings and structures, including new roofs, stonework, and remodeling
- Nearly completed the renovation of Ulrich House using many dedicated volunteers
- Repaired stonework and foundation of Quinter-Miller Auditorium

The *Planting the Future* capital campaign began in 2019 with the goal of raising 1.1 million dollars to establish a strong foundation for the future through strategic planning, the development of an outdoor education program, and modernization of our facilities.

Strategic planning and outdoor education have become core elements of the Camp Mack program. By the end of 2021, funds had been used to build the Esther and John Hamer Health Center and the Peace Garden, a favorite stop for many of our guests.

In August of 2022, we celebrated nearing the end with a barbeque meal on the Ulrich House patio. The final goal was reached in November.

In the fall of 2022, volunteers under the leadership of volunteer construction manager Steve Keim transformed Ulrich House into a comfortable and accessible adult retreat center. This meant giving the interior a facelift, completing ADA restrooms, updating heating with added air conditioning, installing a new roof, and providing new furnishings that include the elimination of all bunk beds.

We thank all who participated in this milestone capital campaign that will truly impact the sanctuary experience for generations of campers and guests.
